PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Term 2 started smoothly for the majority of the school although for those students and staff on the Italian tour there was an unexpected delay in Venice as they waited for the lifting of the flight ban due to the Icelandic volcanic eruption. Neither the students nor teachers were too concerned about the chance to spend two more days in this beautiful city but all agreed it was a great relief to be finally on the plane. Highlights of the tour were the billets with families in the northern town of Tirano where Mount Lawley signed a memorandum of understanding with a new sister school Balilla Pinchetti, and trips to Rome, Florence, Naples, Pompeii, Milan, Pisa and finally to Venice. I certainly felt privileged to accompany the students and I commend them as wonderful ambassadors for our school.

Unfortunately the delay meant that I was not able to be present for our Anzac Day ceremony. Many people have reported that it was one of the most moving services that we have had at the school. Students were highly respectful of the significance of the occasion and contributed through choral performances and readings. Distinguished guests included Arthur Leggett (who gave an inspiring speech), Des Beard and Captain Shane Moxey from the Army Reserve. Several prefects attended the Mount Lawley RSL ANZAC service on Sunday and our Head Boy **Jack Morris** and Head Girl **Georgie Dolgoy** laid a wreath. On Wednesday Mount Lawley Senior High School conducted the annual Ex-POW Memorial service in Kings Park to commemorate the Ex-POW Association and their lost comrades. 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future. It was attended by all of the Mount Lawley Prefects and Year Councillors while the School Concert Band and Choir performed a number of hymns. I would like to thank all students for their contributions to each event and in particular **Stuart McWhinney** of Year 12 who played 'The Last Post'. I would also like to acknowledge the work of Mr Neil Hudson who coordinated all three events.

Week 2 ended with an exciting and entertaining Arts Festival. It was my first Arts Festival and I was very impressed by the level of participation from students and staff and by the general atmosphere of the festival. It is a great way to showcase the Arts and to provide opportunities to engage our students and I am sure the festival will continue to grow. Congratulations to the Head of Department Dr Dale Irving, the Arts Department and the many other staff and students who contributed to make the Arts Festival afternoon such a success. It was also pleasing to welcome some of our Primary School students to join in the afternoon festivities and to experience life at a high school. Well done to all concerned!

During Week 4 every Year 9 student undertook the NAPLAN tests. These National tests in English and Mathematics have been the subject of national controversy as many educators throughout the country argue that they will be used to create national League Tables that will 'name and shame' schools. While I understand and to a certain extent share the concerns, I also feel parents like to receive the one-off test results that give a national comparison. Some points to consider while assessing the NAPLAN results both from an individual and school perspective are:

- The tests are NOT based on a national curriculum so some sections of the tests are not explicitly taught in the WA curriculum.
- WA is one of only a couple of states that does not have Year 7 students as part of the high school. Hence they don't have the access to specialised subject teachers, particularly in mathematics.
- Any individual test in a one off situation is not necessarily statistically significant due to a whole range of factors that could affect the result.

Having said that, Mount Lawley treats the NAPLAN tests seriously and combined with our own knowledge of student performance, use the results to guide and inform our teachers of student progress and specific areas on which to focus.

During Week 5 all Year 10 students sat examinations in English, Mathematics, Science, Society & Environment and Languages. The results on these examinations have provided valuable information to students and parents when selecting viable pathways and courses for Year 11. Year 11 & 12 students sat their Semester 1 examinations during Weeks 6 and 7 while Year 9 students sat their examinations in Week 7. While examination results do not tell the entire story of a student's achievement they do generally provide reward for effort and indicate where more work is required

During Week 3 approximately 20 staff spent the day undergoing some intensive Course Selection counselling training. With the Curriculum Council New Course of Study Courses now firmly entrenched, it is important all course counsellors are brought up to date with the latest developments. An important recent development that will affect our current Year 10 and 11 students will be the changes to the University of WA (UWA) courses. From 2012 UWA will offer only 5 Undergraduate Courses. Students will be required to do one of these 3 Year degree courses before they then specialise in a course of selection. The 5 Undergraduate degree Courses on offer are

- Bachelor of Arts
- Bachelor of Commerce
- Bachelor of Science
- Bachelor of Design
- Bachelor of Philosophy (Honours)

The degrees feature a simple, flexible course structure that will allow students to move from a broad range of subjects in first year to a more focused approach as they progress. More information can be accessed on the UWA web site.

On Tuesday June 1 over 250 parents attended the Year 10 Information Evening in the school staff room. The main messages that were delivered on the evening were:

- Students should choose subjects and pathways of study for success.
- There is clear evidence of the importance of following teacher recommendations.
- It is important students are engaged with their studies and should choose subjects that interest them.
- Students and parents need to research the careers of interest and understand any prerequisites that may exist for future careers or study.
- Doors never close in education and there are many pathways to success.

I would like to thank Mr Ian Johnson for organising the evening, the Learning Area Leaders, VET and Workplace Learning coordinators for their presentations and the many parents and other staff members for attending the evening.

During Week 9 all Year 10 student and their parents participated in a Subject Selection Counselling session for Year 11 2011. On Wednesday June 16 students and parents were able to access information from over 20 exhibitors including WA Universities, TAFE Colleges, Industry Groups, Police & Defence Force Recruiting and Apprenticeships. Many of the exhibitors commented positively about the behaviour of our students and the intelligent questions that they asked. All gave high praise to the organisation of the event and I would like to congratulate our VET coordinator Mrs Catherine Smith and her team of helpers for organising such a wonderful event.

On Tuesday May 4 I had the pleasure of attending the Year 8 assembly. It was pleasing to see a number of parents attend the assembly to witness their child receive an award. One aspect of the assembly that impressed me was



the awards given for attendance. 62 students received a Gold Award for 100% attendance and another 82 students received a Silver Award for between 92-99% attendance. These are wonderful figures and given the high correlation between school attendance and school success, I am really encouraged by the way our Year 8 students have settled into high school.



On Tuesday May 18 we held our second whole school assembly for the term. The main purpose of the assembly was to launch the Asian and European Language Hubs for the Department of Education. As the lead school the Mount Lawley Language Department is working closely with our feeder Primary Schools to promote and encourage language studies. Special guests at the assembly included

the Director of Secondary Education Ms Lois Joll, MLA for Mt Lawley Mr Michael Sutherland and several Principals and representatives from our local feeder Primary Schools. Other highlights of the assembly were the Student of the Month awards, the Italian tour presentation and the LawleyLive video of the memorable moments of Term 1 produced by our chaplain Mr Andrew Paul.

Mount Lawley SHS has initiated an innovative Senior School 2011 Course of Study program for Senior School students beginning in Term 4 this year. Current Year 10 and Year 11 students will begin their respective Year 11 and Year 12 Course of Study programs in Week 5 of Term 4. The last day of the year will be December 10 for both year groups. Making this change to the normal program will give the Year 12 students an extra 5 weeks to complete what can be a hectic and stressful final year. If you are a Year 10 or Year 11 parent please note this date as your son's/daughter's final day for 2010.

I continue to be amazed by the number of activities and opportunities that are made available to the students of Mount Lawley even during times of stress with examination marking and report writing for staff. Below is a list of some of the events (not all) that have taken place throughout the term that I have reported on in updates throughout the term.

- During week 6 our Year 8 GATE students benefited from the expertise of an Italian cooking expert, who showed them how to make fresh pasta, create a classic carbonara, arrange an amazing amatriciana and finish with a traditional tiramisu.
- On Saturday May 29, 45 of our Year 8 and 9 SVAPA students gained experience and an opportunity to enrich their Arts work as they participated in workshops with visiting experts in the areas of design, devising and movement. On the evening of the 26 May the first SVAPA Year 10 Project class presented their performances and artworks to their parents, teachers and friends in the Tricycle Theatre. The students have had artist-mentors work with them on small contemporary arts projects and this semester-long course has allowed SVAPA students to transition to the Senior School and continue to develop their arts experiences and language.
- On Wednesday June 9, approximately 20 students and staff joined coordinator Ms Suzie Barnes for a morning session of 'Zumba' followed by a healthy active breakfast in





the multi-purpose room in the gym as part of the Proactive Keep Active @ Lawley Project.

- Over the weekend of the 22nd and 23rd March Mrs Leonie Stewart and her team of music teachers took a group of 65 dedicated music students to Camp Araluen in Roleystone. The work done at the camp prepared the students for the Middle School Music Concert conducted on Sunday May 30 and the Farewell Concert conducted on June 22. Both were wonderful performances. The Farewell Concert demonstrated the extraordinary talents of our students and I am sure the hard work and dedication of the staff and students will translate into high quality performances while on tour performing at the Sydney Music Festival during Week 11.

- During Week 8 fifty-two of our aspiring leaders attended the Year 10 Leadership Camp where students undertook activities and workshops aimed at improving their communication and leadership skills that will assist them to mentor new Year 8 students in 2011 as part of our Peer Mentor Program.

On Monday May 31, the Honourable Dr Elizabeth Constable, Minister for Education, visited our school to announce the 'Better Schools, Brighter Futures' policy on attendance. During the morning I had the pleasure of giving Dr Constable an unscheduled tour of our school.



On Monday June 14 Mount Lawley hosted an afternoon tea with Her Excellency Kirsty Sword Gusmao, wife of East Timor Prime Minister Xanana Gusmao. Mrs Gusmao was greeted by student representatives from Mount Lawley's Student Interact Club and our Head Boy and Head Girl.



Throughout the year our students have helped collect and raise money for East Timorese schools and baby clothes for new mothers. Our involvement in this project has stemmed from links made with East Timor by substantive Principal Mr Milton Butcher who is currently serving there as an Army Reserve Officer. It fills me with pride to be able to showcase our school to distinguished guests who are always impressed by the behaviour, attire and attitude displayed by our students.

Our seventh Community Art Auction was conducted on Saturday June 19 and was once again a resounding success. I congratulate the Parent Support Groups from the SVAPA and Music programs who contributed many hours to organise the event. In particular I would like to acknowledge the work of Tracy Kenworthy and her organising committee, the student helpers, auctioneer John Cook, MC Russell Goodrich, web site master John Prior, data base organisers Andrew Venn and Donna Hart-Venn, Andrew Paul and his cadets for organising the parking on the night, Yvonne Scott & her clerical staff for managing the money and the clerical requirements for the event, Mike Camilleri for helping set up and the Music staff and students who provided the entertainment for the night. I also thank Ian Johnson and his Senior School staff for their cooperation to rearrange their rooms for the event.





On Friday 25th June, 3 Year 12 music students, **Jade Richards, Sam O'Connell** and **Josiah Padmanabham** will travel to Shanghai to perform at the World Trade Expo. Across the State eight of the most outstanding music students were selected to represent Western Australian at the Expo and for Mount Lawley to have 3 students selected demonstrates the high quality of our Certificate 1V Jazz Program. Mrs Anita Chong will also travel to Shanghai as a chaperone for our students. We look forward to hearing about the experiences of this group on their return and wish them a safe and stimulating tour.



On July 1 and 2 **Matt Parry** and **Max Owen** of Year 10 will be competing in the 3rd Chinese Bridge Chinese Proficiency Competition for Foreign Secondary School Students held in Adelaide. This is a wonderful opportunity for Matt and Max who will compete against students from SA, ACT and the NT with the winners travelling to China in October to compete in the World High School Competition.

On August 9 substantive Principal Mr Milton Butcher will return from leave. My last day as Principal will be Friday August 6. I would like to take this opportunity to sincerely thank the Mount Lawley community for the opportunity to lead the school this year. I believe that Mount Lawley SHS provides high quality instruction and is a school of opportunity for students. I have thoroughly enjoyed the challenge of working with the community to improve the educational outcomes for Mount Lawley students and I will carry fond memories of the Council, staff, parents and in particular the students of Mount Lawley.

Apart from the usual academic program, punctuated this term for the year 9s by the NAPLAN tests and Semester One exams, we have had a Middle School Assembly which highlighted many students' achievement, the Year 9 Carnival, numerous excursions and camps, and performances by our Music and Drama students. The term culminated in a very successful Parent / Teacher / Student Interview Evening on 1st July.

I would like to highlight one recent event which to my mind epitomises the spirit of the philosophy which we hold, and that was the Year 9 MLSHS Science Investigation Awards presentation from 7.00 – 8.00 pm on Thursday 24th June in Community One. This evening provided the students with an opportunity to showcase the results of six weeks of work investigating a scientific problem of their choice, and the quality of the work they produced was outstanding. The projects, undertaken in association with the Primary Industry Centre for Science Education and the University of Western Australia were very well-presented, and showed a wide range of problems tackled and the enthusiastic adoption of the scientific method in solving them. It seemed that every student in Community One was present, together with at least one parent, and the atmosphere fairly buzzed as everyone walked around the room admiring the displays. Tea, coffee and light refreshments added to the happy and social atmosphere, and when the winners were announced there was universal appreciation for their efforts. Congratulations must go to Jenny Martino, who organised the evening and facilitated the work that the students had done. The combination of student engagement, academic rigour, and parent involvement was a terrific example of middle schooling principles in action.

Former student of Mount Lawley Senior High School (1959-63). Robert was honoured by being awarded Member of the Order of Australia in the Queen's Birthday Honours 2010. The citation states, "For service to contemporary craft and design as a curator and advocate, and to the Art Gallery of Western Australia and the National Gallery of Australia."

Robert Bell (Lawley Alumni Class of 1963) graduated in Design from WAIT in 1966. He worked as Senior Designer at the Western Australian Museum from 1967-77 before becoming curator of Craft and Design at the Art Gallery of Western Australia (1978-2000). Robert is currently Senior Curator Arts and Design at the National Gallery of Australia, Canberra (2000-present).

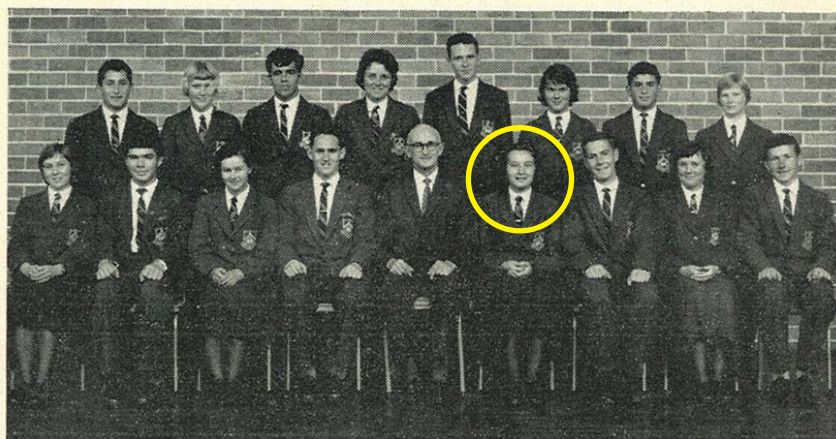

9 STEPS TO UPGRADING YOUR PERSONAL SECURITY ON FACEBOOK



The following information is intended to allow students who use Facebook, to set their privacy settings to a responsible level.

1. Some of your information is viewable by everyone

Everyone can see your name, your profile

photo and the names of work and school networks you're part of. The same applies for pages you are a fan of. If you are worried about a potential employer, your friends or a complete stranger finding out about your interests, avoid becoming a Facebook fan of such groups. You can't tell Facebook you don't want those publicly listed. Your gender and current city are also available, if you choose to specify them. You can uncheck "Show my sex in my profile" when you edit your profile if you don't want it listed, and you can leave "Current City" blank.

2. Your list of friends may also be public

Facebook also considers your friends list publicly available information. Privacy advocates worry that much information can be gleaned from a person's list of friends. But there is a way to hide the list. Go to your profile page and click on the little blue pencil icon on the top right of your box of friends. Uncheck "Show Friend List to everyone." Either way, those you are already friends with can always see your full list.

3. You can hide yourself from web searches

There is a section for "Search" under Facebook's privacy settings page, which is accessible from the top right corner of the web site under "Settings." If you click the "Allow" box next to "Public Search Results," the information that Facebook deems publicly available (such as photo, fan pages and list of friends), along with anything else you have made available to everyone, will show up when someone looks up your name on a search engine such as Google. The information you've limited access to in your profile will not show up.

This is only useful if you want people you've lost touch with, or complete strangers, to be able to find your Facebook page. If you'd rather not be found, uncheck this box.

A second setting, controlling searches within Facebook, lets you refine who can find you once that person has logged on. Limit searches to friends only if you think you have all the friends you need and don't want anyone else to find you when they type in your name to Facebook.

4. Beware of third-party applications.

Quizzes and games are fun, but each time you take one, you first authorise it to access your profile information, even if you have made that available only to your friends. You're also letting the application access some information on your friends.

Under "Application Settings," Facebook lists all the apps you have opened your profile up to. If you no longer want to authorise access to an application you can always remove it by clicking on the "X" next to its name.

Next, by clicking on "Applications and Websites" on the privacy settings page, you can edit whether your friends can share your birthday, photos and other specific information. Remember that applications can access your "publicly available information" no matter what.

The security firm Sophos recommends users set their privacy settings for two of Facebook's own popular applications, notes and photos, to friends only.

5. Go over your list of friends

The average Facebook user has 130 friends. But many people interact with a much smaller group when commenting on status updates, photos and links. So it doesn't hurt to occasionally review your list of your friends to get an idea of just who can view your status posts, personal



photos and funny links you've shared over the years. Don't feel obligated to add anyone as a friend, even if that person adds you first. Be aware that workplaces and schools have rules about Facebook interactions between bosses and employees or students and teachers.

6. Create custom friends groups

If you have "friended" a lot of people, sort them. Think of the groups you interact with in real life — co-workers, school friends, girlfriends, grandma and grandpa — and organise your Facebook friends in these groups, too. Go to "All Friends" under the "Friends" button up top, click on "Create New List" and fire away. Then decide what aspects of your profile, and which status posts and photos, these people will have access to. Or, simply create a "lim-



ited" list for acquaintances or distant relatives and limit their access.

7. Customise your status posts

Type "I'm hungry" into your status update box. Click on the little lock icon. You'll see a range of privacy controls pop up, letting you either allow or limit access to the post. If you want, you can even hide it from everyone by clicking "Only Me" under the custom settings. Click on "Save Setting." Repeat with each post, or create a default setting for most updates and increase or decrease privacy as you see fit.

8. Let your friends know you have boundaries — in person

Some of us have may have checked our Facebook sites to find that an overzealous friend has posted dozens of unflattering or embarrassing photos of you. Chances are, they didn't do this to embarrass you, though if they did you have bigger problems. Rather, they probably don't know that you don't want these photos posted. Yes, tweak your photo privacy settings on Facebook. But if someone starts snapping pictures of you at a party, ask them to check with you before posting it anywhere.

9. Never assume complete privacy

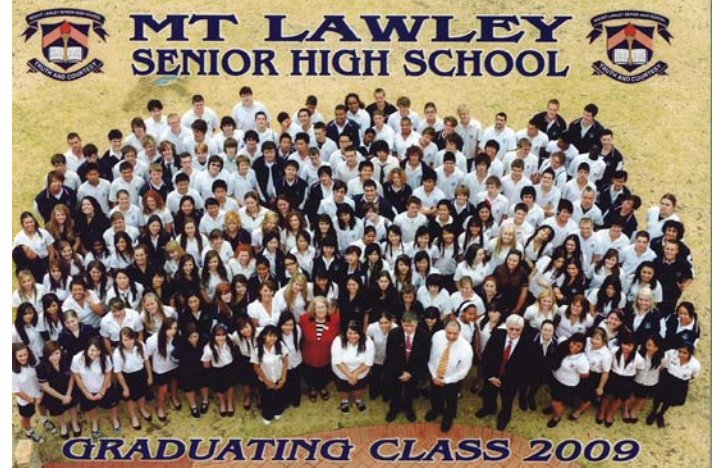
Even for the most tech-savvy person, unflattering and inappropriate photos, incriminating text messages or angry status posts about work, school or friends have a way of worming their way out in the open. Please be careful.

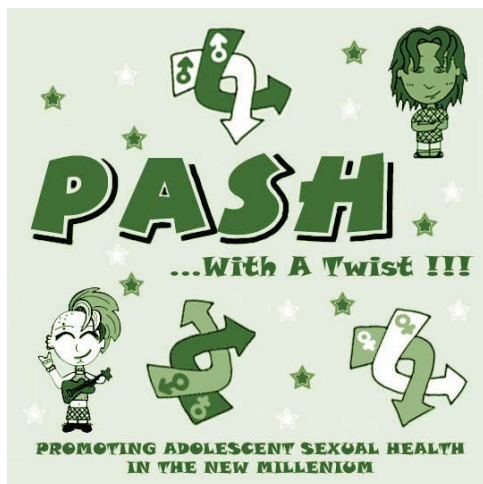
Madeline Lovelle, a year twelve prefect, which outlined the experiences of her recent visit to Turkey to further study the history of the ANZAC's.

TIPS FOR PARENTS WHO DON'T WANT THEIR TEENAGERS TO SMOKE

Parents are powerful role models. It is important for parents who do not smoke to express your opinions to your teenagers about smoking. Teenagers who believe their parents disapprove of their smoking are less likely to take up smoking. Set a healthy example and don't smoke. The following tips can help you talk to your teenager about smoking.

- Talk to your teenager about what you would prefer them to do about smoking cigarettes. You begin by saying "You have to make up your own mind about smoking, but I think....."
- Help your child practice refusal skills. You may say "What would you do or say if someone offered you a cigarette and you didn't want one?"
- Ask your teenager what they think about smoking. You could say "I read that 80% of teenagers in Australia don't smoke regularly, does this sound right?"
- Ask your teenager about risks of smoking (getting suspended, the cost, addiction, the smell, poor health)
- Listen to your teenager to tell you what they think your views are about smoking
- Set family rules about smoking and discuss consequences if these rules are broken. Make your home and car smoke-free. Limit smoking to outdoors

A VISIT FROM AN AWARD WINNING JOURNALIST



In Integrated Studies we've been studying a Media topic, Bias Detection, so Mrs Gardiner organised a guest speaker, Today Tonight's, Graeme Butler. Butler has won the Australian Journalists Association's award for excellence, two years in a row (for coverage of the Jakarta crisis in 1998 and the devastation of Exmouth after Cyclone Vance in 1999) and has been a reporter with Today Tonight since 2000. Previous to that he was with Channel Seven's News.

He shared with us his many experiences as a journalist overseas and in war-torn countries. Butler suggested that what is presented by media is not normally as biased as some members of the public perceive it to be. He intimated that much of what is written about journalists in textbooks is unfair.

The student's interest was reflected in the many questions that were asked. Some of these were:



Predictably the first question was - "How much do you earn?", "What is the best part of the job?", "Has anyone attempted to sway your opinion?", "What is the most memorable story you've ever reported?"

Butler's passion for his work; the people he has met; and constructing a good story were communicated interestingly to us. As a result of his presentation, perhaps we will be less cynical in our perception of how the media operates, and to read our Bias Detection notes with a touch of cynicism!

The day started off at 9:15 at the front gate, when we called the roll and got on the bus. We got to the Perth Art Gallery at 10:00 after leaving at 9:30. We met up with Natasha Hill and the three tour guides, as they explained the main sections of the Art Gallery. At the front foyer we saw a giant insect web, made of real human hair and there was a baby leaning over the edge of a giant hair sack in the Patricia Piccinini exhibition.



We split up into two main groups, got appointed to a guide to a group of 18. As one group got split into two, they searched around the gallery, looking specifically at maths based artwork. As that group went off, the other main group stayed together and learned more about the maths side of it, by redrawing some pieces in relation to perspective.

On the first tour we discovered the main types of illusions like 3D illusions on artwork and as we got closer to the art work we had a second choice of it being 3D or 2D. We saw how maths can assist the design of art pieces including standing upright and not falling, like the brick wall and how it is positioned. It needed maths to make it stay upright and display a 3D effect. We talked about shading and texture to artwork and how artists use it in landscape portraits.

We were very lucky, as one of the pieces, had a man standing in the middle of the Graham Farmer Freeway. We turned around and saw the man who was in the painting. We had to look back and forth a couple of times, as we weren't sure. Peter Farmer explained to us that the freeway was named after his uncle, Graham Farmer. We could see almost real life sculptured like the 'kid who played the game boy' or the 'women who was attacked by creepy monster'. We found some very abstract and vivid works of art. Some was very clumsy and was just splashed and blobbed paint on the canvas. Depth and overlapping were used to show how thick something is or how far it is (is it at the back or at the front?). The use of colour can create a mood in the artwork and you can tell how the artist is feeling.

The second group was told how John Brack created "British Modern". It was based on modern ballroom dancing. The floors were upright like it was a wall. The girl partner had a very false face like it wasn't true. The colours he used were greens, yellows, and oranges. He was trying to represent falseness. Both of their legs were touching a line on the floor board. It was as if it was a tightrope. One move out of place and their career would be over!

We then had to draw the same artwork but in a different way. We had to make a room with a vanishing point to make it more realistic. FROM HOME ECONOMICS.....



In Children, Family and the Community in the context of Caring for Others the Year 11 Course of Study requires students to learn about parenthood. Students have the opportunity to take home a virtual baby and learn about a baby's intrusion into a parent's life and the responsibilities which accompany the role. This aspect of the course is extremely popular and students hold a very strong interest in working with babies.

In Home Economics at Mount Lawley Senior High School, we have three virtual babies. They have a computer chip which can set off their crying and interrupt the student until the baby is settled by comforting and rocking. This may be disruptive but rewarding when our students realise the benefits of correct care result in a happy baby.

Unfortunately some students don't take full responsibility for their role and it is recorded on the computer chip that the baby's are not comforted correctly and not handled appropriately. This poor treatment which is registered on the computer is then assessed negatively and marks are taken from the student's final score.

It is imperative that this learning opportunity be appreciated and all school students take the management of these babies seriously. Students are most anxious to learn from the care of these babies and the staff of this department appreciates the effort that families take in having the babies in their homes. We also know about sleepless nights!

Like real babies ours don't like abuse of any nature, like to be dressed up for special occasions and rocked, cuddled and hugged and their presence shared with others. We welcome new students in for 2011 classes and know they will enjoy and learn from these simulated classes.

MT LAWLEY SHS: COLLECTION OF LEGO FOR CAMBODIAN ORPHANAGE

In December 2009 we were going to teach English, play with the kids and do what ever was needed to help bring some relief and fun to the lives of a group of Orphans in an orphanage in Takeo Province, Cambodia. Through my conversations with the director of the orphanage, we established that he wanted to set up a LEGO centre for the younger kids. LEGO is expensive in most places, but 'cost prohibitive' in Cambodia. The educational advantages of LEGO were never going to be realised unless someone donated the lot. That seemed like a big ask initially, but I thought "We can make that our goal-to set up a LEGO centre for the kids". I just had to acquire the LEGO and then get it to Cambodia. That



all seemed simple enough – and in fact acquiring the LEGO was not hard at all – getting it there proved to be a bigger issue. My enthusiasm was shared by a lot of people; unfortunately people didn't as readily share my positive outlook for the uplift. However, many people searched out second hand or bought new LEGO to donate to my cause, in anticipation that it would be uplifted. Students, teachers and friends all found at least a small box to give me.



I would like to thank all of those students, parents and teachers that helped generate a 35 kilo parcel of LEGO (we divided it into 3 lots) that was thoughtfully uplifted by Air Asia-free of charge. It was a huge success with the kids at the orphanage. We even built them a special table to house half of the LEGO and sit to play at. After the children received the LEGO, they played with it constantly. At any given time of the day, we were always guaranteed of seeing at least 2 students at the LEGO table playing/creating. My next venture begins now – summer clothes for 52 orphans. The challenge is on.....

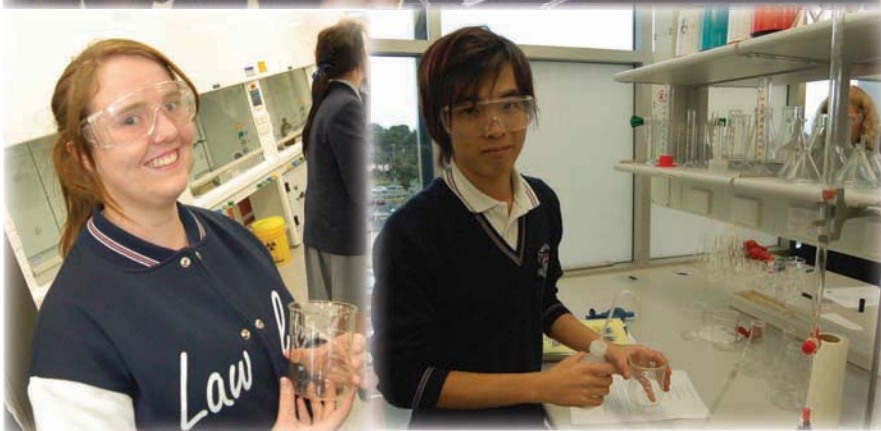

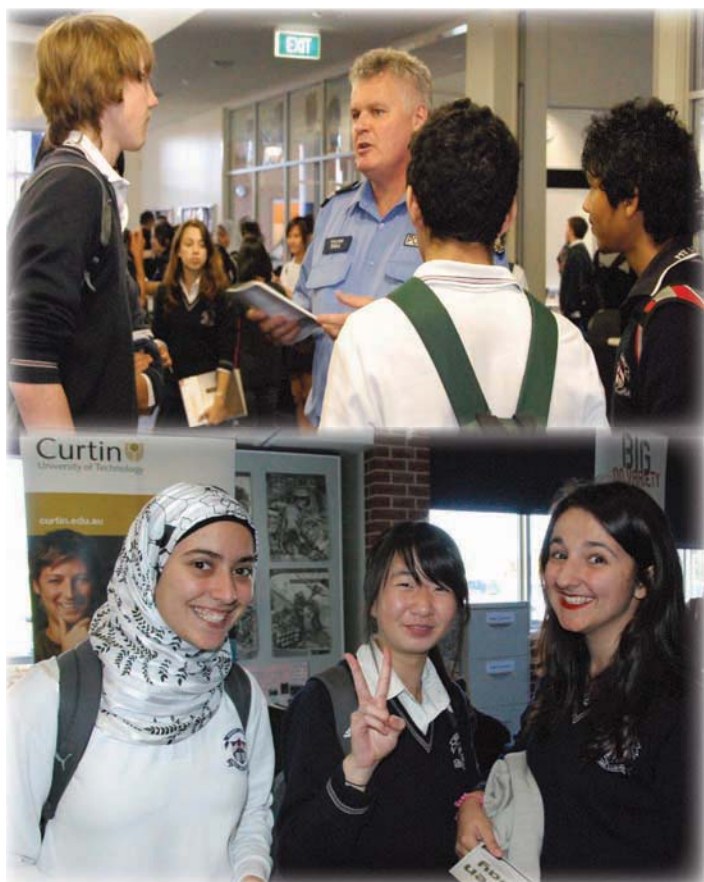
Information was also available about traineeships and apprenticeships, as well as alternative pathways for Year 11 & 12 students.

ANZAC SCHOOL CEREMONY SPEECH

Over the April holidays, I was fortunate enough to travel to Turkey as one of 12 West Australian students on the Premier's ANZAC Student Tour. As well as visiting moving battlefields like Lone Pine, the Nek and the Turkish 57th Regiment Memorial, the aim of the tour was to educate students about the importance of ANZAC Day.



My understanding of the value of human life was dramatically reinforced whilst in Gallipoli. Seeing the thousands upon thousands of Australian, New Zealand, Turkish, British, French, Scottish and Irish gravestones and

headstones had a very large impact on me. No longer can I learn facts about war and interpret the casualty and death rates as just statistics. Each and every headstone,



gravestone and memorial that I witnessed belonged to a person with a family, friends and a life, just like us. A single bullet had the power to end everything right there and then, and for all the names that I saw at Gallipoli, that is what happened. Just like that, a life could be destroyed. This is the reality of war, and the essence of commemorating ANZAC Day.

All I could think about at Lone Pine was how many men my age did not get the opportunity to experience a full life – how many opportunities they did not get to experience because they sacrificed their lives fighting for our country. As a result of my tour to Gallipoli, I have learnt this; we may not have the opportunities we have today in front of us tomorrow. In a split second,



our lives may become drastically changed by a single bullet. There is nothing that we can do to dodge that bullet that has our name on it, but there are opportunities we can and must seize so as not to waste the opportunities the ANZACS gave up for us. After having walked on the beach where a generation drowned in the water, this message is engraved in me.

The ANZACs are true heroes. Their selfless acts of courage have been exemplary. These men are heroes because they gave their lives without hesitation for us. Quite often they knew the odds of surviving were against them, yet they faced the challenge with their heads held high, and with courage, mateship and determination. These men I have walked in the footsteps of, they are true heroes, and I am proud to be able to say that I am an Australian who has witnessed the exact consequences of war.



Today, we thank these heroes for their sacrifices – the importance of ANZAC Day shall never be forgotten. Lest we forget.

FOLLOWING THE FOOTSTEPS OF THE POWS AND 'WEARY DUNLOP' IN THEIR TIMES OF ADVERSITY 1942-1945

On Friday 16th April a group of excited young students from various schools - country and city - left from Perth International Airport on a journey that will change their lives and understandings of war. They embarked upon the "Quiet Lion Tour", travelling to Bangkok, Thailand and then to the Burma border. A tour that began some 8 years ago, taking ex POWs from the Burma-Thai railway with family members and students. The intention of the trip was to educate everyone of the atrocities of war, the POWs lives and the empowering words and deeds of "Weary" Dunlop. This great man saved the lives of countless Australian men in the degrading conditions of the Burma-Thai railway (slave) camps. Through his ingenuity and medical training he was able to improve the chances of survival of these men, a fact not lost on those lucky enough to return to their homes after August 1945. It was a group of these same men that believed the honour of such a great man should be preserved and the understanding of his contributions to our history needed to be passed on to future generations. Hence, the creation of this tour, and the name, an honour bestowed on Weary Dunlop - "The Quiet Lion".

For the first time two students from MLSHS were lucky enough to be invited on this tour . Both students-Kate Prast and Emma Guiffe- are year 11 History students. What they learnt on this tour will be invaluable in their personal growth, but also extremely helpful in their year 12 studies of Australian history. In the photo above, both girls are shown with ex-POWs – Snow Fairclough (a sprightly 89 year old) and Bill Haskell (a determined 91 year old). Both men have accompanied this tour many times. I first met them on the 2008 tour and remain in 'awe' of their strength, courage, determination and spirit. The girls' story follows....

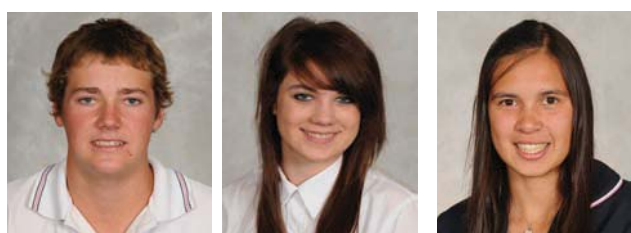

CLOTHES WANTED FOR CHILDREN IN TIMOR LESTE

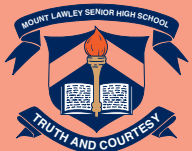
