PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Despite the pressures of examination marking and report writing for staff, many exciting opportunities were available to the students of Mount Lawley over this period. Below is a list of some of the events that have taken place throughout the last three weeks of this term.

- During Week 8 fifty-two of our aspiring leaders attended the Year 10 Leadership Camp where students took part in workshops aimed at improving their communication and leadership skills that will assist them to mentor new Year 8 students in 2011 as part of our Peer Mentor Program.
- During Week 9 all Year 10 students and their parents participated in a Subject Selection Counselling session for Year 11 2011. On Wednesday June 16 students and parents were able to access information from over 20 exhibitors including WA Universities, TAFE Colleges, Industry Groups, Police & Defence Force Recruiting and Apprenticeships. Many of the exhibitors commented positively about the behaviour of our students and the intelligent questions that they asked. All gave high praise to the organisation of the event and I congratulate our VET coordinator Mrs Catherine Smith and her team of helpers for organising such an informative event. I hope that our students and the parents who attended were able to access information which will help in the complex decisions for further education.
- Throughout the term Mrs Jenny Martino has been working in association with UWA conducting scientific investigations with her 128 Year 9 students. On the evening of June 23 the students and their parents participated in a presentation evening of the investigations from which 30 have been chosen to compete in an award excursion to UWA on the June 29. The night was a huge success and the winning investigation in the final will earn \$500 for the successful student.
- On Thursday June 17 Mr Reid Hamilton and Ms Tahlia Milroy organised an engaging and successful Year 9 Sports Carnival. It was pleasing to note the high standard of behaviour and level of attendance from our students.
- During Week 8 Mr Mat Winter led three teams of eager Year 12 Chemistry students to Curtin for the RACI Titration Stakes. This is an analytical competition for Year 12s across the state, to refine their skills in Chemistry titrations and reinforce their understanding of the Chemistry syllabus. Our teams rated 31st, 49th and 62nd. Mr Winter commented that he was very proud of all of the participating students who represented our school with distinction. Throughout the year our students have helped collect and raise money for East Timorese schools and baby clothes for new mothers. Our involvement in this project has stemmed from links made with East Timor by substantive Principal Mr Milton Butcher who is currently serving there as an Army Reserve Officer. It fills me with pride to be able to showcase our school to distinguished guests who are always impressed by the behaviour, attire and attitude displayed by our students.

Our seventh Community Art Auction was conducted on Saturday June 19 and was once again a resounding success. I congratulate the Parent Support Groups from the SVAPA and Music programs who contributed many hours to organise the event. Across the State eight of the most outstanding music students were selected to represent Western Australian at the Expo and for Mount Lawley to have 3 students selected demonstrates the high quality of our Certificate 1V Jazz Program. Mrs Anita Chong will also travel to Shanghai as a chaperone for our students. We look forward to hearing about the experiences of this group on their return and wish them a safe and stimulating tour.

On July 1 and 2 Matt Parry and Max Owen of Year 10 will be competing in the 3rd Chinese Bridge Chinese Proficiency Competition for Foreign Secondary School Students held in Adelaide at the Confucius Institute of the University of South Australia. This is a wonderful opportunity for Matt and Max who will compete against students from SA, ACT and the NT with the winners travelling to China in October to compete in the World High School Competition. Mr James Cheah will accompany the students.

During week 10, 36 of our Year 9 and 11 of our Year 11 students were given the opportunity to extend their knowledge and understanding of the Australian Parliamentary system and our nations history with a tour of Canberra. The tour coincided with the historical appointment of Julia Gillard as Prime Minister and students were given the opportunity to view Question Time involving the new Prime Minister from the very room in Parliament House that she was signed in as Prime Minister earlier in the day. Other highlights of the tour included visits to the National Museum, the Museum of Democracy, the War Museum and a drive up Mt Ainslie which gave the students a wonderful view of Canberra. Congratulations to Mrs Jan Finning, Ms Siobhan Galavan, Mr Brian DeBois and Mr Naso Tsingoida for surviving the week with our students who I understand were fine ambassadors for Mount Lawley SHS. I would also like to thank Mr Geoff Clayton and Ms Lynne Noack for their efforts in organising the tour.

Mount Lawley SHS has initiated an innovative Senior School 2011 Course of Study program for Senior School students beginning in Term 4 this year. Current Year 10 and Year 11 students will begin their respective Year 11 and Year 12 Course of Study programs in Week 5 of Term 4. The last day of the year will be December 10 for both year groups. PASH - PROMOTING ADOLESCENT SEXUAL HEALTH

Adolescence can often be a time of confusion and embarrassment when it comes to sexual development. The PASH program aims to promote sexual health and wellbeing in young people through fun and interactive activities. It gives young people a chance to explore their sexuality and to enable students to make informed health decisions.

This program has been developed by Family Planning Western Australia and is run in the school with the full support of the Department of Education and Training.

This program will run in Term Three. The **PASH** Program consists of a six sessions with a small group of students. The sessions will begin from the second week of term 3.

Sessions topics include:

WINTER ASTHMA WARNING

With the onset of winter and cooler weather, many people find that their asthma seems to flare up. If you or a family member has asthma, you can do the following things to help manage your asthma.

- See your doctor and have your asthma reviewed

- · Ensure your home is heated. A warm bedroom reduces night time coughs and wheeze

TIPS FOR PARENTS WHO DON'T WANT THEIR TEENAGER(S) TO SMOKE

Parents are powerful role models. It is important for parents who do not smoke to express your opinions to your teenagers about smoking. Teenagers who believe their parents disapprove of their smoking are less likely to take up smoking. Set a healthy example and don't smoke. The following tips can help you talk to your teenager about smoking.

- Talk to your teenager about what you would prefer them to do about smoking cigarettes. You begin by saying "You have to make up you own mind about smoking, but I think....."
- Help your child practice refusal skills. You may say "What would you do or say if someone offered you a cigarette and you didn't want one?"
- Ask your teenager what they think about smoking. You could say "I read that 80% of teenagers in Australia don't smoke regularly, does this sound right?"

FACT 1: Young people need to know that most people, young and old, do not smoke.

- Ask your teenager about risks of smoking (getting suspended, the cost, addiction, the smell, poor health)
- Listen to your teenager to tell you what they think your views are about smoking
- Set family rules about smoking and discuss consequences if these rules are broken. Make your home and car smoke-free. Limit smoking to outdoors

The Relationships after Divorce or Separation (RAD) program is a free program being offered by the University of WA and Murdoch University. It is designed to develop positive family relationships through improved communication, reduced parent-teen conflict and enhanced self-esteem. If you are a single parent with teens aged 12-15 years, join us to learn how to tackle problems with confidence, communicate better with your teen, plan for the future and help your teen be successful with this free 7-week program.

In 2010, we are offering two RAD programs, one for single Mums starting in end July and another for single Dads starting in mid-October. The program for Mums has two formats – either learn at home, or a weekly evening group for the mothers and their teenagers. The program for Dads and their teens is only available in the group format.

The group format offers single parents and teenagers the opportunity to meet others in situations similar to their own and learn new skills and techniques for tackling some of life's daily issues. There is free pizza and refreshments as well as free childcare for siblings not part of the group program. Those who opt for the learn-at-home program are provided with a resource kit, study guide and readings to complete, which cover the same topics as the group format.
