### IPS review

The leadership team and the Board have read and discussed the IPS review report. Our next step is to continue to work on our targets within this business plan cycle (that is due to finish at the end of this year) while simultaneously formulating our next business plan.

### Parking

The Learoyd Street Proclamation has been signed and is expected to be gazetted this week. Policing of the street can commence following gazettal. This

means that there will be consequences imposed by ECU for those people who choose not to abide by parking regulations.

### Reports

Reports have been posted this week to give students and families time to read them before our reporting day on 3 July. I encourage all families to take advantage of the opportunity to meet with staff to discuss your child's results and progress.

### Traffic safety

Recent conversations with Mount Lawley Primary School have centred around the need for a shared understanding of the use of our car park and roads around our school. We all acknowledge that there is significant traffic travelling down Woodsome and surrounding streets, particularly at drop off and pick up times. I ask that parents and caregivers do not use the front carpark as a circular driveway and drop off point. This creates congestion and makes it very difficult for assigned users of the carpark and delivery vehicles to use the carpark safely. Recent near misses with primary school students and an accident with a secondary school student have highlighted just how careful we all must be in sharing the roads and abiding by the guidelines of each school.

### Year 10

Several weeks ago we held a very successful Year 10 information evening related to subject selection for Year 11. People were literally sitting in the aisles of the ECU lecture theatre! Thank you to all of the families who made the time to attend and to the staff who presented on the night. This was followed up with the Year 10 counselling sessions that have only just finished. Again, thank you to staff who undertook the training and dedicated days to provide high level counselling to students and their families.

### WEEK 16

#### Middle – Researching Senior – Research Resources

**These articles are to be used with the School Diary which has been supplied by the P & C Association**

#### Learning Goals - at the end of this week your child should have:

- An understanding that the intention of researching is to inspire their curiosity to be knowledge creators, not copiers and pasters of chunks of information from the net.
- A preparedness to question and then check the authenticity of information, an awareness to search for patterns and messages in the information and an understanding of how to compile a bibliography.
- A proactive attitude to use the weekly Habits of Mind and Thinking Tools to strive, thrive and flourish in their living, learning and thinking.

#### Value for Life – Curiosity

Identify three positive behaviours which show Curiosity at home, then at school and then in the community.

#### Wellbeing Focus

Throughout our student's school careers they will be required to complete projects, assignments and investigations into a numerous range of topics. Building resourceful habits into their learning and thinking will enable them to confidently define, experiment, imagine, analyse and make predictions from the knowledge they investigate and create.

Have students ever been explicitly taught how to research, present their findings and complete a bibliography? They were not born knowing how to and we can't assume that they will "pick up these skills " naturally along the way. To cultivate students' researching habits it is essential that they are explicitly taught a logical step by step process, creative and critical thinking and learning what to do when they don't know what to do.

The temptation for 21st century students is that they believe Google will provide all they need to know to complete their learning needs. They Google a topic and often mindlessly copy chunks of information and insert it into their assignments; no defining, no imagination, no experimenting, no discerning, no depth of thought and no grooming of lifelong learning and thinking habits.

Following are some of the aspects of researching that we need to teach students and practise in everyday learning and thinking:

- Brainstorming – encouraging students to think hard about and connect with what they already know about the topic.
- Adventure and adaptability – learning in different ways, in different places and from different sources.
- Meta-cognition – thinking about what type of thinking they need to use in particular situations.
- Gathering and assessing information – being able to find information and be discerning as to its authenticity.
- Reading between the lines – seeing beyond the written word and identifying patterns to investigate.
- Synthesising – putting all their findings together in a coherent and stylish manner.

Another researching approach well worth looking at, which is similar to the one in this week's focus, is called Big 6; Googling will find it for you.

#### Learning Goals - at the end of this week your child should have:

- A willingness to practise the research process steps and to search for patterns, bias, inference and messages in the information.
- A seeding of 'big picture' thinking so that they can be knowledge creators and evaluate their findings critically.
- A proactive attitude to use the weekly Habits of Mind and Thinking Tools to strive, thrive and flourish in their living, learning and thinking.

#### Value for Life – Organisation

Identify three positive behaviours which show Organisation at home, then at school and then in the community.

#### Wellbeing Focus

The main thing our children will be doing in their lives in the 21st century is learning; the world is evolving so rapidly it is essential that we have young adults leaving our schools with the habits and capabilities necessary to learn what they have to learn. These habits include being able to look at an issue or problem and:

- Knowing what to do when they don't know what to do.
- Relate and understand how it connects to their world.
- Identify and find the information they need to address it.
- Develop a timeline to solve it.
- Analyse their findings and look for bias, patterns, inference and implications.
- Present what they learned with clarity and precision.
- Evaluate their thoughts and make sense of them in relation to their world.
- Make forecasts and predictions from their findings.

We need to cultivate these in their every day thoughts and behaviours so that they become embedded habits. This week's focus is on building students' learning and thinking power in this area by introducing them to reliable and resourceful research processes. They provide scaffolds, which enable students to be curious experimenters while at the same time moving forward logically in addressing the issue or problem and making balanced predictions.

Another purpose is to encourage a discerning disposition in them to judge the suitability and authenticity of material from the Net, books, software and resources they source for their research needs. Then once they have researched a topic, the process of correlating, presenting the information collected and then reaching meaningful conclusions are essential components to lifelong problem solving.

#### Learning Goals - at the end of this week your child should have:

- An understanding of a logical sequence to follow to compile a meaningful report of their experimenting, findings and predictions.
- A raised awareness of the importance of communicating with clarity and precision and a willingness to use their dominant Multiple Intelligences in compiling their reports.
- A proactive attitude to use the weekly Habits of Mind and Thinking Tools to strive, thrive and flourish in their living, learning and thinking.

#### Value for Life – Composure

Identify three positive behaviours which show Composure at home, then at school and then in the community.

#### Wellbeing Focus

Cultivating a habit in our children to follow their curiosity, experiment with their learning and be knowledge creators will assist them to develop positive, resilient, resourceful and reflective lifelong learning habits. This often means that we need to change our own approaches and not start from positions of certainty – why do we have to know first?

It is essential to focus on teaching students how to clearly and meaningfully communicate to others what they have learnt and how it relates to their worlds through the Habits of Mind, Communicating with Clarity and Precision and Striving for Accuracy.

The capacity to compile well thought out reports on their learning using their dominant Multiple Intelligences is covered in this week's focus. When students have researched and investigated a topic, it is important that they have the skills to present what they have learnt, new connections and any conclusions made in a coherent and efficient manner.

Children have a variety of backgrounds, differing dominant Multiple Intelligences and an array of learning styles. As such, they should be given opportunities to write and present their reports in a number of different ways. Some inclusive activities may include oral presentations, idea maps, thinking tools such as the Five E's of Learning, essays, posters or presentations using software such as Prezi, Popplet, Animoto, Knovio or Timeglider, just to name a few.

The key point is to personalise learning to cater for the needs of all children. Initiating discussions on this topic both at school and at home to build their Habits of Mind to communicate with clarity and precision and striving for accuracy will cultivate positive growth mindsets in students to flourish.
